Open Ag Technology


We collaborate with partners around the world to drive an open technology ecosystem where platforms integrate seamlessly and users retain full control of their data.

Inspiring stories of women, community & agriculture



OPEN Flower Network



A new field of opportunities for women and gender diverse farmers

Open Flower Network is a multi-year initiative focused on helping women and gender diverse farmers connect, scale, and succeed in the specialty cut flower sector. The program offers new and aspiring flower farmers access to mentoring, skillbuilding, and knowledge-sharing opportunities, focused on 5 key priorities identified in our gap analysis report.

Programming priorities:

- 1. Optimism and growth in the sector
- 2. Access to new markets
- 3. Establishing viability for smallest scale farms
- 4. Utilizing wholesale sales channels
- 5. Time, stress, and burnout

OPENSOURCE AGRICULTURAL DE CONSTRUCTION DE CON



Most agricultural technology—and the data it collects—is controlled by large private companies. A growing movement is pushing back against this proprietary, top-down approach, working to build an open source agricultural technology ecosystem that puts producers and their communities at the center of innovation. At OFN Canada, we're collaborating on diverse initiatives to help turn this vision into reality.

The power of open source agricultural technology is that farmers, researchers, and agricultural stakeholders can share and adapt technology to meet their unique needs while maintaining control of their data.

PROJECT SPOTLIGHTS

D:Food/Web initiative

In 2024, OFN joined a diverse coalition of stakeholders in the D:Food/Web initiative, a project advancing data and food sovereignty through decentralized, community-driven technologies. Since a catalytic <u>DWeb Camp</u> in August, we have been helping to spearhead efforts to establish cooperative data governance, enhance transparency, and develop sustainable funding models that support open, resilient food systems.

A New Approach to Food Commerce in the Québec region

<u>This project</u> will use open source technology to help a group of local markets in Quebec compete with larger retailers. With tech provider Startin'Blox and other collaborators, we will create a unified online marketplace, letting these small markets easily present their products together and offering shoppers a broader selection than any single market could provide on its own.

OpenTEAM

<u>OpenTEAM</u> is a collaborative network of farmers, scientists, engineers, and food companies focused on improving soil health and furthering agriculture's ability to address climate change. Through our work with OpenTEAM, we have helped to support open source, interoperable technologies that foster knowledge sharing and give farmers control over their data.

Data Food Consortium (DFC)

OFN is a lead partner in the DFC initiative, which is developing an open standard for data exchange in food systems. This standard will enable seamless interoperability between platforms, allowing farmers, marketplaces, and consumers to share information, coordinate logistics, and cross-platform facilitate secure transactions-while upholding data sovereignty for small-scale producers.

WATERLOO REGION FOOD DIRECTORY



Sharing ways to eat, grow, and give local

In Fall 2024, we launched an online directory to connect Waterloo region residents with local farms, markets, and food organizations. Working with the Food System Roundtable of Waterloo Region, we designed the platform to go beyond merely listing food sources, to actively engage the community. People of all ages, backgrounds, and needs can navigate the site to explore food options, participate in local initiatives, and learn more about their region's food system.


MAKING CHANGE GLOBALLY

OFN's Global Commons powers 11 national instances around the world. Like OFN Canada, our international colleagues spent 2024 leading food system change in big and small ways. These are some of their projects.

Discover Regenerative

In mid 2024, OFN Australia led an initiative to build visibility and credibility for regenerative agriculture in the country. Working with a network of organizations, they launched the Discover Regenerative directory.

Discover Regenerative allows producers to showcase their products and credentials, and helps B2B buyers to connect with trusted regenerative suppliers.



Procurement for Good Project

In October 2024, OFN UK started work on a four year research initiative led by Coventry University. Procurement For Good aims to create a more sustainable food system in the UK by examining ways to improve opportunities for food buyers in schools, hospitals, and other public sector organizations to include sustainable, locally produced food in their menus and to create new markets for small- and medium-scale producers. The project will work with four pioneering food hubs in England, Wales, and Scotland, and extend the functionality of OFN's open source digital platform to enable food producers to sell to public sector organizations through food hubs.

Food Subsidy Pilot Program


In February 2025, OFN Australia launched an important pilot project that will provide food-insecure households with vouchers that can be redeemed for food at participating community food enterprises. In doing so, this project aims to make regenerative food and short food supply chains financially accessible to more people and communities.
